### THIS YEAR IN PAC-12 WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

• The Pac-12 advanced a team to the NCAA Women's Final Four for the ninth time in 10 years after STANFORD made its 13th all-time trip to the national semifinal. It came on the heels of the Conference earning a record seven NCAA Tournament bids. An additional three teams also earned WNIT bids.

• Pac-12 teams won a league-record 15 NCAA Tournament games (15-7) this season, placing two teams in the Elite Eight for the second-straight year. Pac-12 teams were 7-0 in the first round also setting a Conference record. With a record 10 teams in the postseason, the Pac-12 combined for a 22 wins (22-10).

• The Pac-12 was the best-represented conference in the Sweet Sixteen after a league-record five teams advanced that far with two teams earning a spot in the Elite Eight (Oregon and Stanford).

• WASHINGTON STATE advanced to the WNIT semifinal after winning its first-ever postseason game in the first round. All but one of its WNIT games was on the road.

• Five Pac-12 teams earned a ranking in one or both final national polls, including five appearing in the last WBCA/USA Today Coaches poll of the season, tying a league record that was set last year. Four were ranked in the in the final *Associated Press* poll, also tying a league mark set last year.

• For the fourth-consecutive year, the Pac-12 has had at least five NCAA Tournament teams. OREGON STATE and STANFORD each earned No. 2 seeds, the highest-seeded Pac-12 teams, and WASHINGTON was a No. 3 seed, earning its highest seeding since 1995. UCLA was also a No. 4 seed, the fourth time in seven years the Bruins have received a top-five seeding, and No. 10 seed OREGON received an invite for the first time since 2005. COLORADO, UTAH and WSU earned WNIT bids.

• The 10th-seeded Ducks advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time ever, upsetting No. 7-seed Temple and No. 2-seed Duke in Durham, N.C., to get to the third round. No. 8 seed ARIZONA STATE and No. 9-seed CALIFORNIA also made it out of the first round.

• Washington's Kelsey Plum graduates as the most-decorated women's basketball player in Pac-12 history. She is a unanimous national player of the year award winner, taking home the Wade Trophy, Naismith Award, John R. Wooden Award, and *Associated Press*, USBWA and ESPNW Player of the Year honors. She also claimed the Dawn Staley and Nancy Lieberman Awards for the top point guard in the nation. Plums also leaves her mark in the record books, breaking several marks including the NCAA's all-time scoring record.

• This season also marked a historic milestone for Stanford's Tara VanDerveer, who claimed her 1,000th-career victory becoming one of only three men's or women's Division I head coaches to reach the milestone.

• For the second-straight year, a Pac-12 player also claimed the USBWA National Freshman of the Year honor, this year going to Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu.

• Stanford claimed its 12th Pac-12 Tournament title in Seattle, coming back from a 13-point deficit. Plum was the 2017 Pac-12 Player of the Year, Ionescu was voted the Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and OSU's Gabriella Hanson was voted the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year. The Beavs' Scott Rueck is the John R. Wooden Pac-12 Coach of the Year for the second time in three years.

**STANFORD WINS PAC-12 TOURNAMENT CROWN**

**SEATTLE (AP)** -- Alanna Smith scored 18 points, Karlie Samuelson added 14 and No. 10 Stanford overcame an early 13-point deficit to beat No. 6 Oregon State 48-43 and win the Pac-12 Tournament championship Sunday night.

The Cardinal (28-5) won their 12th tournament title, the most in conference history, and took the Pac-12's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

While Smith was carrying Stanford at the offensive end, the Cardinal shut down Oregon State and star Sydney Wiese, getting a bit of payback for a pair of regular-season losses to the Beavers. Oregon State (29-4) shot just 32 percent, made one shot in the fourth quarter, was held to a season low in points and lost for the first time since Feb. 10.

Wiese led the Beavers with 13 points.

In a season highlighted by Tara VanDerveer getting her 1,000th victory as a head coach, the Cardinal provided another title to their overflowing trophy case.

Smith was a big reason why. The 6-foot-3 sophomore made 6 of 14 shots and carried Stanford offensively with leading scorer Erica McCall held to eight points on 2 of 10 shooting.

Stanford took its first lead since the opening minute of the game on Smith's layup underneath with 7:25 left. Wiese's 3-pointer at the other end was long and McCall added a driving layup to push the lead to 40-36. Samuelson's free throws with 4:23 left gave the Cardinal a 44-38 lead.

Wiese's 3-pointer with 3:23 left cut the lead in half and was Oregon State's only field goal of the fourth quarter. But the Beavers committed turnovers on two straight possessions and Brittany McPhee scored in the lane with 1:10 remaining for a five-point lead.

Oregon State was trying to become the first school to win consecutive conference tournament titles since Stanford's run of seven straight from 2007-13. The loss shouldn't penalize the Beavers NCAA seeding, but any outside hope of landing a No. 1 seed is likely gone.

After making their first six shots of the game and scoring 22 points in the first quarter, Oregon State was 10 of 44 shooting and scored 21 total points the rest of the way. The Beavers were 1 of 12 shooting in the fourth quarter and the 14 second-half points were a season low.

## PAC-12 ALL-CONFERENCE HONORS (COACHES VOTE)

### PAC-12 PLAYER OF THE YEAR - KELSEY PLUM, WASHINGTON

Senior Kelsey Plum (Poway, Calif.) has put together a historic season, leading to a Pac-12 Player of the Year nod, and joining Giuliana Mendiola (2003) as the second Husky all-time to earn the honor. Plum has captured the nation in her pursuit of the NCAA all-time scoring record which she broke on Saturday, Feb. 25. That record had stood for 16 years. On Saturday, Plum also broke the Pac-12 record for most points scored in a season, as well as breaking the Conference's single-game mark, netting 57 points in the game. She is just the 12th player in NCAA history to score 3,000 points, and the only player in Pac-12 men's and women's basketball history to reach the milestone. A national player of the year candidate, she is on the watch lists for the Wade Trophy, Naismith Award and John Wooden Award. She has been named the national player of the week twice. Plum is averaging a nation's leading 31.6 points per game, which is on pace to break the Pac-12 single-season record. On the season, she is shooting 53 percent from the field, 44 percent from three-point distance and 89 percent from the free throw line, where she also holds the career record for most made and attempted, while approaching the NCAA record for most free throws made. Plum has led the No. 11 Huskies to a tie for second in the Pac-12 and a No. 3 seed in the Pac-12 Tournament, the team's best finish since 2002.

### PAC-12 FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR - SABRINA IONESCU, OREGON

A guard from Walnut Creek, Calif., Sabrina Ionescu is the first Oregon Duck to be named Pac-12 Freshman of the Year since 1999 (Shaquala Williams) and is the second Duck to earn the honor all-time. Ionescu has recorded four triple-doubles this season, which is one shy of the Pac-12 record and two less than the NCAA record. She is averaging 13.9 points per game which ranks 12th in the Conference and 10th in rebounding (6.8 rebounds per game), while also averaging 5.65 assists per game, the third-best average in the league. She has been named Pac-12 Freshman of the Week four times this season and was named USBWA National Player of the Week on Feb. 14. Along with her teammate Ruthy Hebard, they are the only two freshman to be named to the All-Pac-12 team this year.

### PAC-12 DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR - GABRIELLA HANSON, OREGON STATE

Senior guard Gabriella Hanson (Anaheim, Calif.) is the third-straight OSU Beaver to win the Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year award after former teammate Ruth Hamblin claimed the honor the previous two years. Hanson ranks 13th in the Pac-12 in steals per game, averaging 1.40 thefts per game. With her leadership, the Beavs have one of the best defenses in the nation, ranking seventh in the country in in field goal percentage defense (34.4) and 11th in scoring defense (54.5 ppg). Oregon State also ranks fourth in the country in rebounding margin (+11.2 rpg), contributing 4.2 rpg. Hanson has started in all 30 games this season, averaging 6.5 ppg. She helped sixth-ranked Oregon State win its third-consecutive Pac-12 regular-season crown and third-straight No. 1 seed in the Pac-12 Tournament.

### JOHN R. WOODEN PAC-12 COACH OF THE YEAR - SCOTT RUECK, OREGON STATE

Oregon State head coach Scott Rueck wins the John R. Wooden Pac-12 Coach of the Year honor for the second time in three years, also becoming just the fourth coach in Pac-12 history to win the honor multiple times. Rueck has led the Beavers to their third-straight Pac-12 regular-season title and a third-straight No. 1 seed in the Pac-12 Tournament. Oregon State goes into the Pac-12 Tournament ranked sixth in the country in the Associated Press poll after starting the season ranked No. 25. Two of his players were named to the All-Pac-12 team, including Sydney Wiese, who has been listed on several watch lists for prestigious national awards, including the Wade Trophy, Naismith Award and Wooden Award.

Four were ranked in the in the final Associated Press poll, tying for the most in Conference history, a mark set last season.

In the coaches poll, Stanford leads the way with a No. 4 national ranking, followed by No. 9 Oregon State, No. 11 Washington, No. 13 UCLA and No. 16 Oregon. It is the first time since 1999 the Ducks are in the final coaches poll.

In the AP poll, Stanford leads the way again at No. 6, followed by No. 8 OSU, No. 12 UW and No. 15 UCLA. Washington is in the writers' poll for the first times since 1995 and the Bruins are in the top 15 for the second-straight year. Is it the second time in the history of the OSU program the Beavers are in the top 10 of the final poll, while the Cardinal are back in the final top 10 for the first time since 2014.

On December 26, seven Pac-12 teams were ranked for the first time ever in the Associated Press poll. Eight teams in all were ranked in either one poll or the other the week of December 18. Since Nov. 18 From Nov. 28-Jan. 9, at least since Pac-12 teams were ranked in a single poll.

## PLUM IS UNANIMOUS NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR

After recording one of the greatest season's in NCAA women's basketball history where she broke several records, including the single-season and all-time NCAA scoring records, Washington's Kelsey Plum is a unanimous national player of the year, earning the title from the WBCA (Wade Trophy), Naismith Award, Wooden Award, USBWA (Anne Meyers Drysdale), ESPNW and Associated Press.

Plum also swept the national point guard honors, taking home the Dawn Staley Award and Nancy Lieberman Award. Plum leaves as the most decorated player in women's basketball history.

## IONESCU IS TOP FRESHMAN

After posting four triple-doubles in a season and leading her team to the program's first-ever NCAA Elite Eight appearance, Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu was the National Freshman of the Year by the United States Basketball Writers Associations (USBWA) and ESPNW. Is it the second-straight year a Pac-12 player has received the USBWA freshman honor.

## MULTIPLE PLAYERS RECEIVE AP ALL-AMERICA NODS

Joining Washington's Kelsey Plum, a unanimous pick, on the All-America teams are teammate Chantel Osahor and Oregon State's Sydney Wiese. On the Associated Press All-America team, she was joined by teammate Chantel Osahor (second team) and Oregon State's Sydney Wiese (third team).

Four more were honorable mentions, including California's Kristine Anigwe, UCLA's Jordin Canada, and Stanford's Karlie Samuelson and Erica McCall.

Plum was also named a Wooden All-American and WBCA All-America team. Osahor was also named to the WBCA All-America team.

## PLUM CLOSES BOOK ON HISTORIC CAREER

Washington's Kelsey Plum closed her collegiate career in the NCAA Sweet Sixteen with her name peppered all over the NCAA and Pac-12 record books. Most significantly, she leaves as the all-time NCAA Division I leading scorer, netting 3,527 points while also averaging a Pac-12 record 25.4 points per game. Her 1,109 points this season alone propelled her to the record and also set a NCAA record for the most points in a single season.

It took her just 11 games into her senior campaign to break the league's career scoring mark. She then scored a Pac-12-single-game record 57 points in the final regular-season game to break NCAA all-time record, which had stood for 16 years.

Plum eclipsed the 3,000-point plateau on Jan. 13, becoming the 12th player in NCAA history to reach the milestone while also becoming the first Pac-12 player, men's or women's, to surpass it. She is the only player in league history to score 1,000 in a season. Her 31.7 ppg this season also shattered the all-time Pac-12 record.

Other records that succumbed to Plum's onslaught are the all-time free throw shooting record for makes and attempts. Her 912 career free throws are a NCAA record and her over 1,000 attempts from the line are also a league best. She also claims the record for most field goals made and attempted.

Not to be forgotten, but her six-career 40-point games, including five this season, are a Pac-12 record, as well.

## WIESE BREAKS 3-POINT RECORD; PLUM NOT FAR BEHIND

Plum is not the only one breaking records. OREGON STATE's Sydney Wiese topped four-time Stanford All-American Candice Wiggins in the three-point category. Wiese is the first player in Conference history to make 300-career threes.

Wiese also is the NCAA's three-point field goal career list, currently sitting in a tie for 12th entering the final week of the regular season.

Plum moved into second on the Pac-12's career list, not far behind Wiese, and is tied for 22nd in the NCAA all-time. Plum became just the second player in league history to crack 300 in the category.

## VANDERVEER TOPS 1,000 WINS

In her 31st season on the bench at Stanford and over 37 years as a head coach, Hall of Famer Tara VanDerveer became just the second NCAA division I women's basketball head coach, and just the third men's or women's head basketball coach to reach 1,000 career wins on Feb. 3. She joins an exclusive club that includes the late Pat Summitt of Tennessee and Duke's Mike Krzyzewski. VanDerveer's teams have won 20 or more games 31 times, including each of the last 15 seasons. In 2013, she became just the fifth college women's basketball coach to win 900 career games.

## PLUM BREAKS ALL-TIME SCORING RECORD

The most prolific scorer in Pac-12 history, Washington's Kelsey Plum broke the Pac-12's all-time scoring record in just the 11th game of her senior campaign, surpassing 2014 WNBA Rookie of the Year Chiney Ogumike of Stanford. The fastest in league history to 2,000-career points, she is only the third player in Conference history to score at least 2,500 points, having scored over 700 points in each of her three seasons. Her name in the top five all-time is among elite company, with two WNBA Rookies of the Year, two No. 1 WNBA picks, four WNBA first-round picks, two WNBA Most Valuable Players and a pair of WNBA Champions occupying the four other spots.

## IONESCU RECORDS FOURTH TRIPLE-DOUBLE

It did not take long for Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu to put her mark in the record books, en route to earning national freshman of the year honors. On Feb. 10 against UCLA, she recorded her fourth triple-double of the season, putting her just one away from breaking the single-season Pac-12 record.

Ionescu is one of just three players in Pac-12 history with multiple-career triple-doubles and is in second place all-time. Stanford's Nicole Powell, who is serving as the Ducks' assistant coach under Kelly Graves, holds the Conference's single-season record with five during the 2001-2002 campaign and posted six during her career, tied for the third-most in NCAA history.

Ionescu is tied for third in NCAA history for triple-doubles in a single season. In a span of 16 days over three games, Oregon freshman Sabrina Ionescu recorded triple-double performances twice from Nov. 27-Dec. 12. Her first triple-double of the season was the first in Oregon history since 1988.

### TRIPLE-DOUBLES GALORE

There were seven instances of triple-double performances by four players this season, the most triple-doubles in a season in Pac-12 history. Washington's Chantel Osahor, UCLA's Jordin Canada, Oregon State's Sydney Wiese and Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu have each recorded triple-doubles this year, Ionescu leading the way with four. Prior to this season, the most triple-double occurrences in a season in league history was five in 2014.

### OSAHOR TOPPLES RECORD

Washington's Chantel Osahor posted one of the best games in Pac-12 history grabbing a Pac-12 single-game record 30 rebounds on Jan. 22 in Pullman, while adding 20 points. The senior became just the 11th player in NCAA history to record a 30-rebound game. She also grabbed her 1,000th-career board, making her just the 20th player in Pac-12 history to reach the milestone.

Osahor broke the single-game record that was recently set by Oregon's Jillian Alleyne, who had a 27-rebound outing in 2012 to set the mark. The 30 rebounds were more than the rest of her team combined (25) and equaled the Cougs' game total.

### ANIGWE SCORES 1,000TH POINT

California's Kristine Anigwe joined the 1,000th-point club on Jan. 8 to become just the 28th player in Cal history to reach the milestone. Only a sophomore, Anigwe needed just 47 career games, ranking her in a tie for 20th-fastest all-time in collegiate women's basketball history, which includes AIAW and NCAA. She is also the fastest in Pac-12 history, which dates back to 1986-87. Oregon State's Carol Menken scored her 1,000th point in her career which spanned 1979-81, prior to the start of women's sports in the Pac-12, which ties for the fastest ever in collegiate women's basketball history.

### BRUINS HOME COURT

UCLA was 16-0 this season at home, extending its home winning streak to 31-games, the second-longest active home-winning streak in the nation behind UConn's 62. No other team in the Pac-12 was undefeated at home this season. Washington had the most wins with 18, Oregon State won 16 on its home floor and Stanford 12.

## TOP DAWGS

Washington Huskies Kelsey Plum and Chantel Osahor led the nation in scoring and rebounding for most of the season. Plum averaged a nation's best and Pac-12 record 31.7 points per game, while Osahor grabbed 15.3 rebounds per game. Osahor's 30 double-doubles were also the most.

The Pac-12 Stanford's Karlie Samuelson's (48.5 percent) and Oregon's Lexi Bando (47.5 percent) ranking second and third, respectively.

Oregon's Sabrina Ionescu leads the nation with four triple-doubles. No other player has more than two.

## ANIGWE TIES (THEN) SINGLE-GAME SCORING RECORD

California's Kristine Anigwe, last year's USBWA National Freshman of the Year, netted 50 points to tie the then-Pac-12 all-time single-game scoring record on Dec. 8 against Sacramento State, making her only the second player in Conference history to score 50 points. Anigwe was 19-for-23 from the floor in that game, also going 12-for-19 from the free throw line.

The original record was set nearly 28 years ago on March 10, 1989 by USC's Cherie Nelson against the Golden Bears. Since then, the record was only threatened twice (USC's Tina Thompson, 49 points, Jan. 27, 1996; Cal's Alexis Gray-Lawson, 47 points, Jan. 23, 2010), until Anigwe tied the mark.

The 50-point outing is also the second-highest scoring individual game in the NCAA this season behind Washington Kelsey's Plum's 57-point game on the final game of the regular season to set the new Conference mark.

## NCAA ACTIVE CAREER LEADERS

Washington's Kelsey Plum's and Oregon State's Sydney Wiese's impact on their respective programs can be seen in the NCAA's active career leaders list.

Plum leads all active players in career points, at over 3,000 points for her career (800 in front of the second-place active leader), and is also the active leader in free throws made at over 800 (300 ahead of the second-place active leader). Plum does not just get to the free throw line, but also makes them with the best percentage from the line among active leaders at 88.0. She also has the most field goals made and attempted, and free throws attempted among the active leaders, and her career-scoring average ties for the best.

Wiese has the most career three-pointers made and ranks in the top five in three-point field goals per game and three-point attempts.

Two of the top-four career active leaders in three-point percentage are from the Pac-12 with Oregon's Lexi Bando leading the way with the second-best three-point percentage (45.7), followed by Stanford's Karlie Samuelson (44.3) in fourth.

UCLA's Jordin Canada's career assists average is also in the top five among the active players, as are UW's Chantel Osahor's rebounding numbers, putting her at over 1,000 in total.

## STEPPING UP

Pac-12 teams recorded six keys non-conference wins this season. Most recently, California upset then-No. 20/21 Oklahoma in Las Vegas. Arizona State defeated then-No. 19/23 Florida to claim the ASU Classic title on Dec. 4. The

Sun Devils overcame a 12-point, fourth-quarter deficit to win the game. Earlier that same week on Nov. 30, USC upset then-No. 25/19 Texas A&M in College Station. Over the Thanksgiving week, Oregon defeated then-No. 24/19 Michigan State by 33 points on Nov. 22, three days after Colorado took down then-No. 15/19 Kentucky at home. ASU has another big win, defeat-No. 15/18 Kentucky in Lexington. The Sun Devils took a late lead in the fourth quarter then needed overtime to clinch the win.

## NEW HEIGHTS

With six players standing 6-foot-3 or taller, OREGON is tied with Kansas State and Texas for the tallest roster in Division I women's basketball this season. Oregon's tallest player is 6-foot-6 freshman forward Lydia Giomi from West Seattle, Wash., the tallest player on the Oregon roster in 10 years (Jessie Shettlers, 6-foot-6, 2003-07).

In the Pac-12, the next tallest teams are CALIFORNIA, STANFORD and USC, each with five players standing at 6-3 and taller. The tallest player in the Conference is ARIZONA's Eugenie Simonet-Keller, a center from France who is listed at 6-8. The second-tallest player is CALIFORNIA's Chen Yue, a center from Beijing, China, who is listed at 6-7.

## HISTORIC CAMPAIGNS

While 2016-17 was filled with many historic moments, it came on the heels of last year's record-breaking season. In 2015-16, the league sent two teams to the NCAA Final Four for the first time ever, the Pac-12 had seven teams selected in the 2017 NCAA Tournament, going undefeated in the first round for the second-straight year. The Pac-12 was the only conference to go undefeated the last two seasons, going a combined 2-0. Another first this year is five teams in the NCAA Sweet 16, besting last year's four Sweet 16 teams. The Pac-12 had the No. 1 conference RPI for most of the second for the second-straight year.

Last year, saw historic rounds that included three Elite Eight teams and four Sweet Sixteen teams, both first-time accomplishments for the league. Owning the No. 1 Conference RPI in the country for the majority of the season, conference teams won 14 NCAA Tournament games last season, a league record.

## COACHING VACANCIES

As the season officially comes to an end, two programs will be looking for new mentors to lead the teams. Cynthia Cooper-Dyke stepped down after four seasons on the Trojan bench, leading the team to its first Pac-12 Tournament title in 2014. Mike Neighbors resigned after leading the Huskies to the program's first-ever NCAA Women's Final Four last year and a 29-6 record.

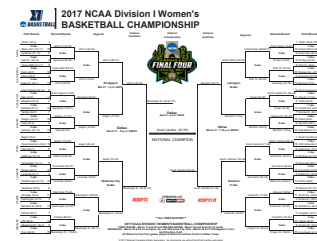

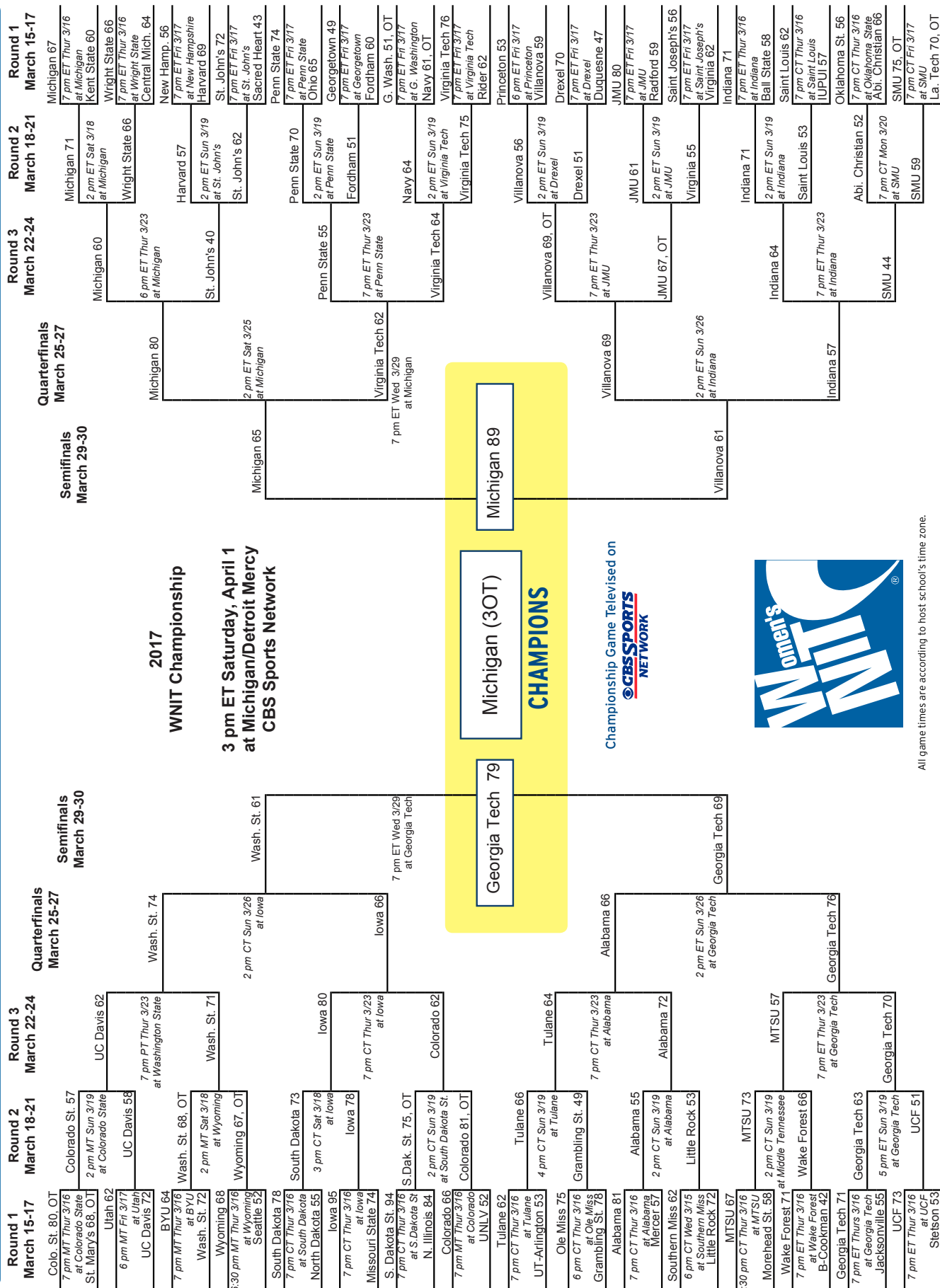
