RECORD NUMBER PAC-12 TEAMS HEAD TO NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Seven men's, five women's teams to compete in Louisville

Seven men's teams, a Pac-12 record, and five women's teams are heading to the NCAA Division I Men's and Women's Cross Country Championships in Louisville, Ky., on Saturday, Nov. 21. The COLORADO men headline the teams headed to the championship, as the two-time defending champion.

A Conference-record seven men's teams will be participating at the NCAA Championships. The No. 1 Buffs are the overwhelming favorite with plenty of veteran experience. Colorado is expected to field four runners with championship experience. The Buffs are coming off a win at the NCAA Mountain Regional which came after they claimed a fifth-consecutive Pac-12 title. CU has never lost the men's Conference meet since joining the Pac-12 in 2011.

OREGON junior Edward Cheserek will be going for an unprecedented third-consecutive individual crown. He has already won a Conference-record three-straight Pac-12 titles and also became just the third person in league history to win three titles in a career, joining former greats Steve Prefontaine and Henry Rono.

The Ducks were third at the NCAA West Regional, finishing behind WASHINGTON and STANFORD. The 11th-ranked Huskies claimed their first-ever NCAA West Regional after placing fourth at the Pac-12 Championships, UW had four runners in the top 15 to claim the West title in Seattle led by senior Tyler King.

The Cardinal surged from No. 23 to No. 4 in the country after placing second at the Pac-12 Championships just 11 points behind the Buffs. Stanford had not run a full squad until that point and at full strength, led by junior Sean McGorty. The Cardinal had runners finish 6-7-8 place second at the West Regional, claiming the second automatic berth to the NCAA Championships.

CALIFORNIA makes its first NCAA Championship appearance since 2010 and is only its fourth all-time. The Golden Bears have had a solid season and are ranked No. 27 in the country. Redshirt senior Chris Walden had a strong finish at the Pac-12 Championships earning all-Conference honors after a 10th-place showing. He was also Cal's top finisher at the West Region meet, placing 19th overall while helping the squad to a sixth-place finish.

UCLA is making its second-consecutive appearance at the NCAA Championships and 11th overall. Senior Lane Werley has been a consistent runner for the Bruins in his career and looks to lead the Bears again in the postseason, placing fifth at the Pac-12 Championships. But he is expected to have some help from fellow senior Sergey Sushchick, who was the top finisher at the regional meet with a ninth-place finish.

WASHINGTON STATE is also making a return to the NCAA Championships after a three-year absence. The Cougars had a strong showing at the West Regional as John Whelan and Michael Williams came in second and third place, respectively, helping the team to a fourth-place finish, the best finish at the meet since 2011, the last time WSU earned a NCAA Championship berth.

It is the seventh-straight year the Conference has had at least five member schools earn a NCAA Championship berth. COLORADO earned an automatic bid after claiming the NCAA Mountain Region title by a slim one-point margin over No. 1 New Mexico. The Buffs are the No. 2 team in the country and edged out OREGON at the Pac-12 Championships for the title by just six points.

The fifth-ranked Ducks avoided an upset, winning the NCAA West Region crown by just one point over Boise State. Senior Waverly Neer was the top Pac-12 finisher at the regional, coming in second place, while sophomore Allie Cash's sixth-place showing by just over second faster than the seventh-place runner gave UO the West crown outright.

No. 13 Stanford was fourth at the regional meet but was without senior Aisling Cuffe. Cuffe sat out the 2014 campaign but in limited action this season, has been a difference for the Cardinal. She won the Pac-12 crown this season for the second time in her career (also winning in 2013). She is expected to race in Louisville which could mean a high finisher for the team after placing fourth at the 2013 NCAA Championship.

WASHINGTON is always a strong contender at the NCAA Championships winning its only title in 2008. Ranked 12th in the latest rankings, the Huskies were third in the regional race, the stongest of the regionals competed. UW turned in three top-15 finishes led by Maddie Meyers' third place.

UTAH is in the midst of the program's best season ever, earning a spot in the NCAA Championships for the first time ever as a team. The No. 21-ranked team in the country, the Utes earned their first-ever ranking in the coaches poll for the first time this season and remained in the polling for two weeks. Utah is coming off two of its best finishes in program history, placing third at the Mountain Regional and fifth at the Pac-12 Championships.

Also joining the field as an individual is UCLA's Carolina Johnson. The Pac-12 Freshman of the Year, she was the highest rookie finisher at the Conference meet placing ninth and earning All-Pac-12 honors. She turned in an impressive 26th place at the Wisconsin Adidas Invitational in early October for her collegiate debut and was also 11th at the West Regional to help the Bruins place 10th overall as a team.

E.P. "Tom" Sawyer State Park in Louisville will host the NCAA Championships for the second time. The last time it hosted this event in 2012, it turned out the closest finish for the top-three finishers in NCAA history. Oregon's Jordan Hasay was third in the women's 6,000 meter race, finishing just 0.7 seconds behind the national champion.

The Ducks have the most men's titles of any Pac-12 team, ranking fourth all-time with six. The Buffs have won five times overall. The most individual national titles have been won by Pac-12 schools, with Oregon and Washington State tying with seven each.

On the women's side, Stanford's five are the most for any Pac-12 team, second most in the country.

POLL NOTES ... The recently crowned Pac-12 Champion COLORADO men's and women's teams lead all Pac-12 teams in both national polls and the Pac-12 has the most men's teams ranked of any conference in the country and is tied for the most on the women's side ... The two-time defending NCAA Champion Colorado men received all 12 first-place votes again after losing one in the previous week. STANFORD surged 19 spots to No. 4 after ranking 23rd in the previous polling. OREGON, led by three-time Pac-12 Champion Edward Cheserek, is ranked No. 7 in the country after placing third at the Conference meet. WASHINGTON saw improvement in the polling, moving up three spots to No. 17, while UCLA dropped to No. 20 ... The women's polling has the Pac-12 tied with the ACC with five ranked teams. COLORADO regained the No. 2 spot after slipping to No. 3 in the previous ranking. OREGON was edged out of the top spot of the podium in Colfax by just six points but the Ducks still moved up one spot into a tie for fourth place in this week's poll. STANFORD was 11th, followed by WASHINGTON at No. 12. UTAH, which made its first-ever debut in the polling in the previous ranking, sits at No. 20 this week.

NCAA REGION RESULTS ... COLORADO swept the NCAA Mountain Region Championships as the women pulled an upset with a one-point edge over No. 1 New Mexico. In the West, the OREGON women also had a one-point advantage to claim the title over Boise State. The WASHINGTON men nabbed its first-ever West Region title on its home course in Seattle.

USTFCCCA REGION HONORS ... OREGON junior Edward Cheserek was named the USTFCCCA Men's West Region Athlete of the Year after having an impressive regular season that included decisive wins at the Pac-12 Championships and at the NCAA West Region Championships. Men's USTFCCCA Region Coach of the Year honors went the COLORADO's Mark Wetmore (Mountain) and WASHINGTON's Greg Metcalf (West).

PAC-12 CHAMPIONSHIPS ... COLORADO swept the Pac-12 Men's and Women's Cross Country Championships for the second time and first since 2011, the year the Buffs joined the league. The men's squad has never lost the Conference meet since joining in 2011, winning their fifth-straight title. The women's team edged out defending champion OREGON by just six points.

Oregon's Edward Cheserek became the first person in the history of the meet to win three-straight individual titles. Only two other runners have ever won three titles (but never three in a row): former Duck great Steve Prefontaine (1970-71, 73) and former WASHINGTON STATE great Henry Rono (1976, 1978-79).

STANFORD senior Aisling Cuffe sat out all of 2014 because of injury but came back to claim the individual crown for the second time in her career. She was also the individual winner in 2013. UTAH had its best-ever finish in the Pac-12 race, placing fifth overall.

PAC-12 SCHOLAR-ATHLETES OF THE YEAR ... Stanford's Aisling Cuffe and COLORADO's Morgan Pearson were named Pac-12 Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Aisling, a two-time Pac-12 Champion, is a biology major with a 3.54 GPA. Pearson, who helped the Buffs win a fifth-straight Pac-12 crown, is a mathematics and economics major with a 3.45 GPA.

Edward Cheserek (Newark, N.J.) becomes just the second person all-time to earn the Conference's athlete of the year honors three times. The only other runner to achieve the feat was Washington State's Henry Rono who garnered the award in 1976, 1977 and 1979. Cheserek won the Pac-12 individual crown for an unprecedented third-straight year and became only the third person to claim the individual crown three times, joining Rono (1976, 1978, 1978) and former Duck Steve Prefontaine (1970, 1971, 1973). Cheserek won the 2015 Conference meet in a time of 23:06.3, leading Oregon to a third-place finish with 83 points.

John Dressel (Cobert, Wash.) was the highest freshman finisher in the field at the Pac-12 Championships with a time of 23:19.4. He placed sixth to earn first team All-Pac-12 honors. He was also the second Buffalo finisher, helping the team win its fifth-straight Pac-12 crown. The No. 1 team in the country since the

final poll of the 2013 campaign, Buffs have not lost the men's title since joining the Conference in 2011. It was only his second official race of the season after making his collegiate debut just two weeks prior at the NCAA Pre-Nationals Invitational where Colorado won the race.

After sitting out the 2014 season because of a fractured back, Aisling Cuffe (Cornwall-on-Hudson, N.Y.) made a big comeback and won her second Pac-12 individual crown after winning the 2013 crown. Cuffe won her second-career Conference title with a time of 19:53.1 as No. 11 Stanford placed third in the final team standings with 80 points. Cuffe is a two-time cross country All-American, finishing fourth at the NCAA Championships in 2013.

Carolina Johnson (Linköping, Sweden) finished ninth at the Pac-12 Championships, the highest freshman finisher in the field, posting a time of 20:17.5. Johnson has made an immediate impact this season for the Bruins, finishing 26th in her first-collegiate meet at the competitive Wisconsin Adidas Invitational in early October.

Mark Wetmore was voted the men's and women's Pac-12 Coach of the Year by the league's coaches, taking home the men's honor for the fifth-consecutive year and claiming the women's accolade for the first time. Wetmore led the Buffaloes to a sweep of the Pac-12 Championships on Friday, Oct. 30, the second time he has done that with the first time being in 2011. The men's squad has never lost the Pac-12 race, winning the Conference title for the fifth-straight year. The Buffalo men are the No. 1 team in the country and have been since the final poll of the 2013 season.
