LONG JUMP

1. Randy Williams (USC), 25 feet 8 inches: "It (winning jump) was not what I expected, even though I am only a freshman. It was not a fast pit, the wind was swirling. I think I could have done 26 feet in another pit. The runway was not one of the fast ones. I went into the meet with an optimistic attitude. Bouncy Moore (the Oregon jumper who didn't compete) was the main one I was really worried about. With him out, it took some of the pressure off. I wasn't that disappointed in the UCLA dual meet (he finished third) because I didn't touch the board. That was my first high pressure meet since the state high school meet last year."

2. Finn Bendixen (UCLA), 25 feet 5 inches: "I was pretty made before my last jump because I thought I had a fair chance of winning it today. (He went from third to second on his final jump). I thought I could go 26 feet again, but on a day like this, with the wind, you have to have some luck. You always have a lot of come-troughs in a meet like this, like Conway (Craig Conway, Cal freshman, third at life-best 25-2 1/2). This is a good pit, a very fast runway but the wind is not good; it keeps changing." Bendixen is Norwegian and hopes to represent Norway in the Olympics. "I've put a lot of work into this season with that aim. First you have to meet the Olympic standard (he has surpassed it with a 26-0 jump he "thinks" will be accepted) and then do well in our national championships in early August. But we have two others in Norway who have jumped 25-10 and another at 25-9 1/2."

SHOT PUT

1. DOUG LANE (USC), 66-11 1/4 (meet record and lifetime best): "It surprised me a little—I didn't think it would be quite that far. I knew I would have to get a good one early (his winning throw was his first one); I've always done well against Pete (Schmuck, the runner-up) but he's a helluva competitor. I took it easy this week, I had some good work Monday but I only took about 10 throws all week. I think I have a chance to make the Olympic team, but there are a lot of good ones to beat. That event is going to be a real pressure test. This is the first meet this year I've really been able to get myself psyched up; one thing that pleased me was that I kept calm all through the competition. Very often I get excited and lose my composure. I can't tell you how good it feels to get Dallas Long's (school) record; I've always felt he was the greatest shot putter ever, way ahead of his time." Lane is 6-3 and weighs 295 pounds, "still a little heavier than I'd like to be but losing weight is just impossible."

2. PETE SCHMUCK (OREGON), 65 feet, 10 1/4 inches: "I felt bad. I wasn't loose. My back was tight. But I threw my second best put ever. It wasn't a complete disaster. I had three big weekends in a row and then was down last week. I was looking for 68 feet today because of my good physical workouts. It was a bad day for me and a good day for him. Things fell apart after my warmups. I was just too tight. I imagine I was pressing a little. He threw first (Lane threw 66-11 1/4 on his first toss). I just haven't come back mentally from those three good weeks."

JAVELIN

1. BRUCE KENNEDY (Cal), 249 feet, 5 inches: "This is a great facility for throwing; it's like throwing on a bowling green. I had a good week of practice but when you face competition like this you never know what will happen. I don't think this was my best series—I had five throws over 239 feet against USC—but this was best because I had a 249-5, my second best throw ever. (Actually he had four throws over 242 feet today.) I feel I'm getting back where I should be—I hope so, it's about time I did something. When you throw 249-10 as a freshman and then 244 as a sophomore, it's pretty discouraging. I would like to throw 262 feet this year and break the African record (260-4). It's held by a South African so that's even a bigger reason to break it. (Kennedy is Rhodesian. I'm sorry we aren't going to the NCAA meet (Cal is on probation). I was in the top eight last year and I figured I could get in the top four this time and be a Rhodesian All-American."

2. GARY FELDMAN (Wash), 248 feet, 8 inches: "It was my first meet competitively in a month. I have been throwing hard but from a short run. I have got a long time before the nationals. I had no pain, only a little tightness (he had pulled a groin muscle). There was no excuse though for today. I am shooting for the NCAA and the Olympic Trials. I guess my feet weren't fast enough. I just couldn't put it together today."

STEEPLECHASE

1. BILL KOSS (Washington), 8:42.0: "This is the second time I've done Jim (Johnson, his teammate who was second) in on the last barrier. The first time was the dual meet against Oregon. This is 12½ seconds faster than my I've ever run before (that was 8:54.6 against Oregon), but it was so cold up there we were growing icicles, so I don't think it was indicative of how fast I could go. I didn't go out real fast but I went out comfortably; I felt real good with three laps to go and I thought I could catch Jim. It's great to feel that strong during this race. We were most concerned with Jim and I going 1-2; our strategy was for neither of us to take the lead in the first mile, but I guess Jim felt the pace was too slow. I guess my improvement is due mostly to physical maturity (he missed the 1971 season with a foot injury suffered playing basketball). I didn't have a time goal this season; I suppose the next mark to get is the Olympic qualifying standard of 8:38. My goal in general was to run as well as I could, and I wanted to break nine minutes. I haven't run as well as I can yet; I'm satisfied, but I think there's a lot of room for improvement. I felt before this meet I could take a large amount off my time. Our training program has been geared to this meet and the NCAA; we've deliberately stayed away from too many steeplechases—Jim and I have each run just two this year before today. (Koss also has run a 4:04 mile, 13:37 three mile and 28:41 six-mile this year)."

2. JIM JOHNSON (Wash.), 8:42.2: "I didn't follow the plan we (Koss and Johnson) set out earlier. We planned to go out and let the other lead. But the first quarter was so slow that I decided to take the lead. I wanted to push the pace so the others couldn't win with a kick at the end. We thought we could go 1-2 (Bill and himself). Bill runs very strong from behind. I thought I could hold him off. I didn't know where he was until the final hurdle and then he was in front of me. I was a little bit dissatisfied with the time because I wanted to hit the Olympic standard (8:38)."

POLE VAULT

1. KIRK BRYDE (Washington), 16-9: "I'm glad we changed the pit that way; it worked out well for me. (pole vault is usually run the other way but Payton Jordan shifted it just before event began.) Told that Jordan said wind usually came up from other direction, shifting about 3 p.m., Bryde said, "No, meteorologist Scott Cryder (the USC vaulter) watched the weather report last night and told us we'd have a low pressure area instead of a high pressure area. I was fourth on the countback before my last vault at 16-9. Jeff Taylor, our freshman vaulter, told me before that last jump, 'If you ever got back in your life, get back now.' I remembered that during my jump and I got back well. On some of my earlier vaults I was jumping through the bar. I'd like to go to the Olympics (he is Canadian) but they have another vaulter, Bruce Simpson, who has done 17-0 and I'll have to jump against him. They might take us both but I'm not going to worry about that, I want to assure myself a seat on the plane first. I'll vault against him at Modesto (California Relays) next week. (Simpson was a freshman at UCLA a while back, now is at U. of Toronto.) I would have preferred the weather today to be a little warmer; the wind really bothered us when we got up to 16-9."

2. ROBERT PULLARD (USC), 16 feet 3 inches: "On the first few vaults I had a good tailwind. When I started vaulting at 16-9 I started getting a crosswind and couldn't get going. The weather was real bad. I couldn't move like I wanted because it was cold. I hit the bar on the way up on my second try at 16-9. If my second vault had been as good technically as my last try, I think I would have made it. I was trying for 16-9 even though I was ahead on fewer misses at 16-3."

1. HAILU EBRA (Oregon State), 4:03.2: "I wanted a slow pace. I thought it was a fine race; I was happy. I had no plan. I expected a slow pace. Yes, I expected to win. I knew before that Prefontaine would not run—my coach told me he wouldn't. But I was hoping he would run." (Hailu is Ethiopian.)

2. CLIFT WEST (Cal), 4:04.8: "After Prefontaine dropped out I kind of figured it might be a slow pace. I stayed on Hailu, figuring to go with him, because we run more or less the same kind of race. I would rather have had a fast pace because I was looking for a sub four-minute mile (for himself). But I wasn't disappointed. I started to go out on the first 110 yards of the last lap, then I slowed down but I felt good on the backstretch so I sped up again but I knew I couldn't carry it so I saved something for the finish. I figured somebody like McClendon (Oregon) might set a fast pace."

DISCUS

1. ~~Jesse~~ JIM PENROSE (~~Cal~~ Cal), 185 - : "I like to get a good throw on the first throw, I can relax then and then settle down and go for a mark. (His winning throw was his first one today). But this wind was driving us both (him and second place Mac Wilkins) crazy—it was really tough. I'm not satisfied, though; I think even under the conditions I should have hit about 190. I've been putting quite a bit of time into the shot lately, because we needed the points. I'm not pleased with the series; it's awfully hard to get a good throw late in the competition, because you're cooling down and then warming up. It's a credit to Mac that he could come up with a big throw late in the competition." (Penrose will throw tomorrow at Antelope Valley).

2. MAC WILKINS (Ore), 185 feet, 4 inches: "I made my best throw on my last try but was second all the way in the competition. Today was not my best throw, and I was not that pleased with my performance." It was Wilkins' first loss to a collegian this year. "Today it was who was looser and I was tighter. It was my first real competition of the year. It bothers me that he (Penrose) will not be in the NCAA. He has done nothing wrong (referring to Cal being ineligible for NCAA competition).

HIGH HURDLES

1. Charlie Rich (UCLA), 13.7: "I have run it (13.7) three other times. Today wasn't as big as I thought it'd be. I was expected to do better, 13.6 or better. I'm on my way, beginning to peak. My times should be lower. I ran 13.6 last year. I wasn't pushed too much. I felt strong though. My start was pretty decent. I got ahead about the third hurdle when I usually take the lead." Commenting on the 440 Relay and exchange between him and ~~Rene~~ Gordon Peppers of UCLA, he said, "We just didn't make the connection. We lost it between the two of us."

2. Jerry Wilson (USC), 14.9: "I strained a muscle in my left leg when I fell in intermediate hurdles yesterday and it bothered me today. The same thing had bothered me for four weeks but yesterday it felt a lot better until I fell. I just can't pull; I tried to pick up momentum in the highs today but every time I did I hit a hurdle because the leg was not coming over fast enough."

880

1. RICK BROWN (Cal), 1:47.7: "I've been wanting to get a good time—I don't know if I could have gone faster, it just depends on the race, the conditions, everything. My goal was to win, but with respect to the competition I also wanted to get a good time to qualify for the Olympic trials. I felt I should make my move where I did; I decided that before the race. Yes, I expected the kind of time I ran; I've been making my move there most of this year (unlike last year when he began his stroke particular. They're all tough. I think I'll run a mile (open mile) at Modesto next week; I've never run a mile in college. I ran 4:40 once in high school. I don't know how fast I can run the 880 this year, that's something I want to find out."
(Brown is a sophomore and won his second straight Pac-8 title)

2. STEVEN BENCE (Oregon), 1:48. : "I thought he (Brown) would go fast just to psyche us and die at the end so I held back, but he just kept going. I guess his time before today just wasn't indicative. I thought the time today would be slower, a tactical race. The wind? I didn't notice it but it could have been a factor."

100

1. WARREN EDMONSON (UCLA), 9.4 (also second in 220) — "I was a little worried I had a slight soreness in my groin, I was kind of leery about it. But I felt good. I was pleased with the 100—I have the whole race down pat now, I think—blocks, arms, knees, everything. In the 220 I was looking for Quarrie. Brown ran a good race (like Brown, the winner from USC). "I think I have a good shot at the 100 meters for the Olympics. I've only lost twice this year—once I was under the weather and once when I lost to Mel Pender I stumbled coming out. We put up a good fight for the team title and I still think we'll win the NCAA."

220

1. LEON BROWN (USC), 20.8 : (also second in 100): "The last time I won a 220 was two years ago I think. I have had some pretty tough competition since then. I know Don ~~Wacknitz~~ (Quarrie) couldn't go. He just ran for the point. We want to save him for the nationals. We had to pick up the slack. It had to be me or Willie (Deckard). My start was bad again (as in the 100), but I ran a good curve. I just wanted to hold off Edmonson on the curve. I dropped my arms a little bit on the straightaway. Quarrie told me to do this. He helped me run it right. There was a heavy wind down the straightaway. You can't fight it. You have to run relaxed into it. I heard it was 12 miles per hour. I felt real good. It feels easier when you win. I was even with Edmonson coming off the curve and opened up the last 10 yards."

On the 100: "It was all right except for the first 10 yards. That's where I lost it. ~~Now~~ I was sort of in the air at the start. That's where I lost it. I was two or three yards behind. I haven't been able to drive enough at the finish."

INTERMEDIATE HURDLES

1. Jean Pierre Corval (UCLA), 52.2: I Asked how the team competition affected his race, he said, "I was running to win anyway. I didn't know where the team was (in the scoring). Nobody pushed me. I should have started faster and had a very bad last curve. I changed my strides on the curve. I am happy I won it but not with my time. Two guys tried to catch me after the last hurdle but I had the power at the end. I think Jackson hit a hurdle. I haven't trained enough, not enough 440 races. I should be under 51 now."

2. TOM LONG (Stanford), 52.3: "I expected it to be a little faster but the wind was pretty strong; I expect it had something to do with it. I wasn't surprised with my finish, I thought I could do it although my time hadn't shown it. (He ran a life best 52.1 in the trials). I went out fast but I always run the race that way. The problem before was that I haven't been able to hold on in the last half of the race. But I'm getting more experience over the hurdles now. I think with some more training I can go faster."

THREE MILE

1. Steve Prefontaine (Oregon), ~~13:32.2~~ 13:32.2: "It was a hard race. I had a stitch in my side that bothered me a little--I didn't feel myself warming up. I think the early pace took a lot out of me so after a mile I decided not to go for time, just to run to win. I was just looking for the win today. The wind was a factor, I think. Now I'm strictly preparing for the NCAA (he will not run at Modesto). No, I don't set up time goals at the start of the year, I set them as I go along. No, I don't have any for the NCAA." End of interview.

2. Jim Johnson (Washington), 13:36.0 : "I don't think I'll try to double in the NCAA--I imagine they'll have trials in both. Sink (Sid Sink, Bowling Green), did it last year but there aren't many Sinks around. I'll decide later, but it'll probably be the steeplechase--I don't think anybody this year, at least in the U.S., will beat that guy (indicating Prefontaine) unless he breaks a leg."

TRIPLE JUMP

1. James Butts (UCLA), 54 feet, 4 3/4 inches (Pac-8 and Pac-8 meet record): "I did it (the winning jump) on my second try. I knew I was out there. I was ready today, trying for 55 feet. I was off balance on my step. I'm happy with the 54. I was going into a headwind. If there was no wind at all, I thought I could go 55 or 56. I really felt good. On a runway like Stanford, you really got to work on it. It's quick but springwise it's dead. My last jump usually is my best. I passed until my last jump after the second, but then I fouled." Butts' jump was his lifetime best.

2. Denzy Jackson (USC), 51 feet, 6 inches (on last jump): "The thing is I knew we needed the points. I knew Donald was out. I had to concentrate to get the points. I just as I went to jump (his last), I saw Ed (Garrison) win the 440. I felt the win against me. But I was ready to jump because earlier I had been scratching. The wind helped me keep from scratching. I was fourth going into the final jump."

440

1. Edesal Garrison (USC), 45.4 (Stadium Record): "The difference between the UCLA dual and this for me was my emotion. We had more emotion here. We didn't give UCLA credit before the dual and then when we looked up they had it won. My friends have been waiting for me to win the big one. I am a senior. I have to go out in style. Coach (Ken) Matsuda (USC asst. coach) has been begging me to run all out, at least once. I am basically a lazy person. The coach asked me to put in a good one today. When Don got hurt, I used that as a springboard. I was going to do it for my friends and Don and the other guys. He and John (Smith) don't worry about winning and losing. He knows I'm good and I know he's good. Lane seven makes you run hard. They can see you. You're ahead at the start. Once I was ahead at the last curve I had it. Wayne Collett won this race in lane eight last year. But I almost hit the wall. I was going to try to push off it. My strategy was to beat them to the straightaway and hang on."

HIGH JUMP

1. Dwight Stones (UCLA), 7 feet, 1 inch (Pac-8 meet record):
"For sure the team competition was on my mind. That's all I thought about, the points. It was pretty fierce competition. A lot of people were making 6-8 and 6-10 on their first jumps. Also, the good people were in front of me. I was tied with (Dean) Owens (USC) at 7-0 and had to make 7-0 just to stay with him. But the pressure seems to help me like in the USC dual meet. I told myself just to relax. I have been in a semi-slump the last month and a half (after Kansas dual). I started to go down a bit and wasn't able to make 7 feet until the USC dual. Owens and Rick (Fletcher) missed at 7-1 and then I made it. I was fired up today. I had a lot of spring. I had to get first or second, second if Rick got first. I just barely nicked the bar at 7-1 but it stayed up. I wasn't ready to make 7-2. Rick was behind me in misses and I was glad to win for once."
